State of New Mexico Forestry Division

What We Do

1. The Forestry Division participates in several nationally recognized programs that guide homeowner and landowners with wildfire prevention and preparation.
 - The Forestry Division works with local, state, federal, and tribal partners on these efforts to reach every corner of the state. The Forestry Division is also responsible for providing critical information during wildfires on state and private lands.
 - District staff work with communities in their area to develop individual wildland fire prevention and preparedness plans. Interagency programs, such as Ready, Set, Go!, Smokey Bear, Living with Fire, Fire Adapted Communities, and Firewise USA®, allow communities to tailor programs to fit their population size and local landscape.
2. Cost-share on thinning of hazardous fuels on private lands
3. Conservation Seedling Program for private lands.

Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS)

What We Do

The Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) Program, a federal emergency recovery program, helps local communities recover after a natural disaster strikes. Various activities under the EWP Program, include:

1. Remove debris from stream channels, road culverts, and bridges;
2. Reshape and protect eroded streambanks;
3. Correct damaged or destroyed drainage facilities;
4. Establish vegetative cover on critically eroding lands;
5. Repair levees and structures;
6. Repair certain conservation practices, and
7. Purchase of EWP Buyouts.

Grant Soil and Water Conservation District

The Grant County Soil and Water Conservation District work directly with landowners to conserve and promote healthy soils, water, forests and wildlife. Soil and water conservation districts (SWCDs) are independent subdivisions of state government. SWCDs conserve and develop the natural resources of the state, provide for flood control, preserve wildlife, and protect the tax base.

What We Do

1. NRCS requires a sponsor to engage the federal emergency watershed program. The Grant SWCD will convene an emergency meeting to adopt an emergency watershed action. Grant SWCD works with property owners to address water management and soil erosion issues but the most effective and appropriate action we can take today is to engage the Natural Resources Conservation Service's technical assistance and federal money.
